Bits of Allegany County News

Belmont enjoys good milk. Richard E. Hall, farmer-distributor, sent a sample for exhibition to the State Fair. Commissioner Baldwin wrote Mr. Hall congratulating him upon the apparent control exercised over the quality and advising him a diploma of merit had been awarded his project.

Pillmore's first telephone, in the Ricker Hardware store, was put into operation 40 years ago this month.

Angelica has been advised that a recent inspection by state sanitation agents of its water system found the supply safe and of sanitary quality.

Bolivar's Main street, where work is nearing completion, has been widened 14 feet and new lights installed. General Electric engineers claim the lighting system is the best in the state. Bulbs in 29 lights, set staggered 65 feet apart on cement posts 15 feet high, have porcelain faced shades to reflect rays downward. All other electric lines run back of buildings and telephone wires are in underground channels. No poles will be left when the work is finished.

Bolivar's Central School registered 716 pupils when school opened September 4th. 212 high school and graduate students, 504 in grades. In 1895 the school had but 228. Consolidation of districts accounts for the increase. Friendship Central School enrolled 421, against 326 25 years ago.

Little Genesee S. D. B. church has begun a three weeks series of evangelistic meetings, Miss Irene Brainard preaching, Miss Agnes Geiger in charge of music.

Allegany County Fair first premium for poster advertising milk consumption was won by Valentine Brainard of Friendship.

Alfred University has enrolled 115 freshmen.

Whitesville's high school students won premiums at the Angelica Fair on their exhibit totalling \$76.50. Whitesville is undergoing an epidemic. Several old barns were torn down and converted into garages and now "everybody's doin' it."

Clarksville reports purchases of laying and near-laying hens on the Haskell at 55 cents each. Alfred will hear Dr. Conradi, who has been working among German Seventh Day Baptist churches, on the evening of the 18th. Allegany county's early frosts have been freakish in their effects. Corn and potatoes have been badly hurt on both high and low ground, while at other places both high and low they have not been hurt at all. Damage was by no means general.

Recipe for the Week

ROCKS

Brown sugar, 1 1/2 cups; eggs, 3; cinnamon, 1 teaspoon; raisins, 2 cups; fat 1 cup; cloves, 1/4 teaspoon; flour, 3 cups; English walnuts, 1 1/2 cups; baking powder, 3 teaspoons; salt, 1/2 teaspoon. Cream fat until consistency of thick smooth cream. Add sifted and measured sugar and salt gradually, and beat until light and fine grained. Combine well beaten eggs with fat and sugar. Beat vigorously between alternate additions of liquid and flour which has been twice sifted. Sift in baking powder and stir in well. Add dredged, chopped nuts and raisins last. Drop from teaspoon on greased Baking Sheet and bake ten minutes in a moderate oven. These cookies will improve with age.
