Bits of Allegany County News

Belmont thinks it ought to have a temporary foot bridge over the Genesee river at Schuyler street while the new structure to carry present day traffic is being built this fall and winter to replace the horse-and-buggy-days bridge now serving there. A count showed 581 pedestrians used it on a school day, 499 on a Saturday. Figures will be sent to state highway engineers.

Bolivar's new Allegany Refiners, Inc., plant is now using 1,000 barrels of crude daily. An additional 300 barrels daily of incoming oil was recently added to its supply. Friendship's Chamber of Commerce is seriously discussing one well-organized drive to raise funds for all local charities in one community chest.

Friendship's Rod and Gun Club was so successful in hatching and liberating young pheasants that the Conservation Department of the state sent it 75 adult birds for field trial purposes.

Cuba's Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring an indoor fair and exposition for the days of November 27 to December 1, inclusive. Karl Middleton of Dansville will organize local talent and there will be exhibition booths by local firms.

Scio has lost its milk plant and dairymen thereabouts are being paid a differential of ten cents per hundred to truck their product co-operatively to the Borden Milk Products Company's plant at Belmont. The owners of the Scio plant, the Jensen Milk Company of New York City, claims to patrons that it can buy milk in the New York market cheaper than it can buy and prepare it in Scio and ship to the metropolis. The plant was closed last Sunday. Four employees are affected.

Cuba firemen won a cup for coming the longest distance awarded them at the Smethport fair. It was the second silver trophy won this season.
