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EDITORIAL  
THE TYPEWRITER  
D. Nobles

To me one of the most enticing of modern inventions is the typewriter, a machine for making legible characters or printing without the aid of detached type.

The typewriter has a square frame which holds a number of compound levers worked from a keyboard. Each key has a corresponding letter or symbol at the extremity of the levers. As the keyboard lever is depressed, the opposite end of the lever is struck upon an ink ribbon, carrying it against paper held around a hard rubber roller and making an impression of the letter or symbol carried on the lever. A device moves the roller at every stroke, thus spacing the letters correctly.

In the recently improved typewriters, the writing is in full view of the operator instead of underneath the carriage. There are red and black ribbons instead of black only, and they have a device which turns the paper for a new line automatically when the carriage is pushed back or "thrown."

The standard typewriter was introduced by Remington in 1874, to which model most of the best machines have been brought.

A very late invention is the electric machine in which the depression of a key is transmitted to a letter which causes it to move by electricity and not leverage. Another still visionary machine is to operate with a cylinder from a phonograph, reproducing automatically on paper what has been spoken in the phonograph.

The number of words per minute which a skillful typist can produce ranges from 40 to 100 while the most legible of scribes can write no more than 30 to 50. On the average it is found that the typewriter can produce five times the amount of material the human hand can in the same amount of time with less fatigue. Up to 15 reproductions of copy can be made at one time.
