Fenner as head of the town and county expense committee, and Mr. Fenner goes on the charities committee, succeeding Morton, moved to the head of the highway committee.

Burial was in Rural cemetery at Whitesville.

Bits of Allegany County News Belmont is looking forward to October 23 when bids will be opened by the state highway department on a new Schuyler street bridge over the Genesee river. Specifications call for a structure with a 105-foot girder and two 84-foot spans, 45 feet wide and concrete approaches. Belmont Girl Scouts, Troop 1, have in use the residence on Phillips Creek which they recently purchased and refitted as a camp and headquarters. Oranell's Route 1 crossing of the Pennsylvania railroad is to be straightened and otherwise improved by the state highway department, bids to be let October 23rd. Allegany county girls and boys were gathering chestnuts at a lively rate 60 years ago this time. Forty years ago they were reported quite plentiful and well up in price. Today hardly a tree is alive in all the county. Bolivar thinks the three potatoes raised by J. C. Anderson of Horse Run, weighing 4 1/2 pounds each are as large as any grown in the county this year. One of them measured seven inches long. Bolivar is 1,632.6 feet above sea level at the U. S. Geological Survey bench mark at the sun dial in the Bolivar Central School grounds. Everything, nearly, in that village revolves around that fine school and all the county is proud of it, too. Richburg High School students, conducting a school paper on one page of the Bolivar Breeze, call their effort The Purple Quill. Portville boasts a three-pound tomato. Clarksville reports it 27 above zero on October 2nd; South Cuba 28. Short Tract lost its well known resident and former general store proprietor, J. W. Marriott, Oct. 2. He leaves five sons, two daughters, five sisters and five brothers. He was 57 years old.
