GENEVA STATION LISTS NEW FALL PUBLICATIONS

Many Bulletins and Circulars on Wide Variety of Subjects Now Available—List Will be Supplied. As outside work lets up a bit with the coming of the fall and winter months, there is a marked increase in the call for publications of the State Experiment Station at Geneva. To aid those who would keep posted on new station bulletins, they have prepared a list of all available bulletins and circulars. A copy of this list will be supplied upon request and the several publications on the list may be obtained as long as the supply lasts. Reflecting the major lines of work under way at the Experiment Station, the publications may be grouped in three general classes, namely, dairying, fruit growing and vegetable growing. Several new contributions to each of these groups have been made within the past few months and those whose special interests lie in one of these fields will doubtless find these new publications helpful.

For the dairy farmer, there is a new circular on mastitis with particular reference to methods for detecting the disease. Also, Bulletin No. 645 gives an account of the breeding history of the Station's herd of Jerseys with very practical suggestions on applying the lessons learned from this herd to the farm herd.

The vegetable grower will find a long list of bulletins and circulars dealing with various phases of his industry, with three new circulars which have just come from the printer on the growing of cucumbers, muskmelons, and cauliflower and broccoli. Then, too, the 53rd annual report of the Director, covering the entire work of the Station for the fiscal year that ended on June 30 will soon be available. The Station is also announcing the publication of a quarterly paper entitled "Farm Research," which it is sending to all farmers on the mailing list. Those who wish may have their names added to the list to receive this quarterly paper which will keep them informed on the work of the Station.

Chemicals to be Used Against Forest Fires

Chemical compounds may be used in the future for extinguishing forest fires. The opportunity for the employment of chemicals in this field may become much broader than has ever been possible in combatting other types of fires, says the New York State College of Forestry, Syracuse, N. Y. While no definite determinations have been arrived at in the application of chemical compounds to forest fires, enough is known by those who have been experimenting with this problem to indicate that a method of extinguishing forest fires by the use of dust-chemical combinations from the air eventually may be developed. We know that efficient dust mixtures have been developed which can be applied from an airplane and that these dust combinations can be produced in commercial quantities at fairly reasonable prices. Moreover, these materials can be stored at convenient points available for use on short notice. It is believed that thru these chemical compounds, it will be possible to put an end to major forest conflagrations, particularly if the compounds are applied from the air. In fact, it may be that a new era is at hand in which the burning of millions upon millions of acres of forest land each year will become a thing of the past. This would be one of the most important advances in forestry as fire generally is considered to be the greatest menace to our forest resources. News job printing pleases.

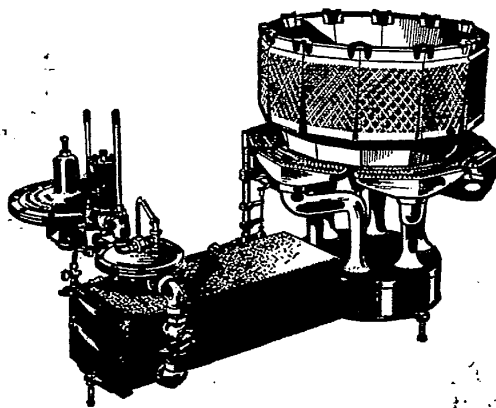
