Daily Household Helps
1—If you are trying to patch up the old wall paper with pieces from the attic, first put the patches out in the strong sunshine for a day or so and fade them to the color of the old paper. The patch will not be nearly so obvious.
2—If you find the dog's kennel has a leak in its roof, mend it in this cheap and satisfactory way: Tack over the roof a large piece of strong brown paper. Then give it two coats of roofing paint. This will last for several years.

Recipe for the Week
FRUIT CAKE
1 lb. citron 1 dozen eggs
2 lbs. raisins 2 tsp. salt
2 lbs. currants
½ cup liquid (fruit juices or ginger ale)
1 lb. almonds 2 tsp. cinnamon
1 lb. butter 2 tsp. mace
1 lb. brown sugar 1 tsp. nutmeg
1 lb. flour ½ tsp. cloves
Shave and chop heated citron, chop raisins. Blanch and cut almonds. Use regular cake method for mixing remainder of ingredients. Fold in the beaten whites. Line cake pans with three layers of oiled paper. Spread cake batter three inches thick. Decorate the surface with cherries, almonds, etc., if desired. Bake in moderate oven for two hours. The recipe makes nine pounds of cake and will keep indefinitely.
