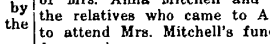
Mrs. Law Former

Recipe for the Week

CRANBERRY PUDDING

1/2 cup butter 1/2 cup sugar
3/4 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt 1 egg
1 cup milk 2 1/4 cups flour
1 cup raw cranberries.
Cream butter and sugar and well-beaten egg. Mix and sift dry ingredients—saving 2 tablespoons of flour for the cranberries. Add dry ingredients to first mixture—then add the milk. Finally fold in the cranberries which have been rolled in two tablespoons of flour. Turn into a buttered mould and steam for two hours.

Sauce

1 cup sugar 2 cups cranberries
3 tbl. cornstarch 1 cup water
1/2 tsp. salt 2-4 tbl. butter
2 cups boiling water.
Mix sugar, cornstarch and salt. Add 2 cups boiling water. Stir until thickened. Cook 10 minutes in a Double Boiler. Cook cranberries in 1 cup cold water until soft. Crush them thru a sieve. Add to cornstarch mixture. Add butter. Serve hot on pudding.

Daily Household Helps

1.—On cold winter days when washing, put clothespins into the oven. This heats them just enough so they help the laundress keep her hands warm when hanging out the clothes.

2.—A soft cloth moistened with camphor is efficient in cleaning a greasy mirror or window glass. Polish with tissue paper or crumpled newspaper.

3.—Cornmeal and vinegar will remove fruit stains from the hands. Moisten the cornmeal with the vinegar and rub on hands. Stains on the fingers caused by preparing vegetables can be removed by holding the hands in very strong tea for a few minutes—then wash with soap and clear water.

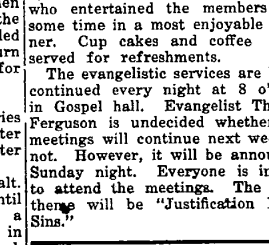
