Recipe for the Week

CINNAMON STARS

1 cup and 8 tbsp. powdered sugar 1 tsp. lemon juice 1 tsp. grated lemon rind 1 egg white 3/4 cup ground blanched almonds 1/2 tsp. cinnamon.

Fold the sugar, lemon juice and lemon rind into the egg white, stiffly beaten. Add the almonds and the cinnamon. Roll three-eighths inch thick on a board sprinkled with powdered sugar and cut into star shapes. Place on a greased baking sheet and bake in a moderate oven of 350 degrees for 8 to 10 minutes.

This recipe makes 24 cookies. Any pattern of cutters may be used for the cookies.
