

No person shall be allowed

to hunt, shoot, trap, kill or capture any fur-bearing animals within the limits of the Village of Andover, N. Y., except that skunks may be lawfully taken during the first fifteen days of the open season as provided by the regulations and laws of the State of New York pertaining
