The second half proved to be much more exciting for the A. H. S. fans. "Red" McAndrew, fast center, got the tip-off to his team mates time and time again. The team worked the ball in some of the snappiest plays Andover has seen in a long time, and succeeded in gaining a total of 23 points in the last half. Friendship, by hard work, managed to squeeze out three field goals and made good four foul shots to make a total of ten points for the last half. The game ended with Andover in the lead with a score of 36-28.

Twelve of Friendship's 28 points were made by foul shots, while Andover relied on fast team work and field goals.

High scorer for the evening was H. McAndrew with a total of 14 points to his credit, with McGill a close second with nine points.

The score might have been higher for A. H. S., but because of too many fouls, E. Kemp, B. McGill and R. Briggs had to retire from the game.
