Food Market Advice

Egg Prices Much Lower
 The high points of this week's market news consists in much lower egg prices, higher meat prices, plentiful cheap citrus fruits, new crop strawberries, and a wide selection of vegetables.

The price of fresh eggs has come tumbling down so that they are plentiful and cheap enough for an orgy of holiday baking, for omelets, souffles and other favorite egg dishes. Very cold or stormy weather may send the price up again temporarily, but the general trend will be down from now until Easter.

Meats Again Higher
 All meats are again higher. Lamb prices have jumped, probably too high, in reaction from the recent too low level. Beef is higher the chuckers are lower in comparison to rounds than in several weeks. Veal and pork are reasonable. Smoked hams will be a good purchase this week. Fowls are cheap and after recent roast chicken and turkey a fricassee should prove pleasing.

Cranberries Nearly Exhausted
 The cranberry crop was so unusually small this year that it is already nearly exhausted. Canned cranberries, however, are plentiful and cheap.

Navel oranges are now considerably cheaper. Florida oranges and grapefruit are good and too cheap—at least from the growers' point of view. Tangerines are more generally distributed and kumquats, for salads and preserving, are now much cheaper. New crop Florida strawberries have begun to come into market but their price is high. Other fruits are about as they have been the last few weeks.

Wide Choice of Vegetables Possible
 Green beans, Brussels sprouts and cauliflower are especially attractive buys this week. White boiling onions too are cheaper than often. Kale, a favorite winter green vegetable, is now in most markets, and mustard and dandelion greens as well as spinach are also available. Even at their lowest, artichokes are not cheap, but they are now as

reasonable as they often get. Celery, radishes and shallots or green onions make an attractive relish dish to substitute for the green salad. However, with endive, chicory, escarole, watercress, romaine and lettuce in market at reasonable price an attractive green salad is inexpensive to serve.

Eggplants and okra are more plentiful since Cuba has begun its shipping season.

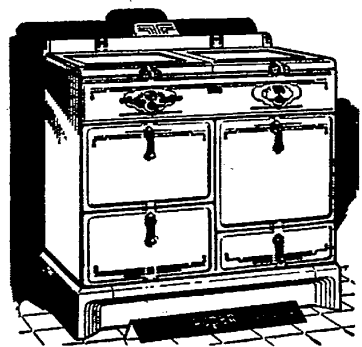
