Washington, D. C.—One of the outstanding sporting achievements of the year was made when two riflemen, Thurman Randle of Dallas, Texas, and L. M. Temple of Scarsdale, N. Y., both exceeded the world's record for consecutive bulls-eyes scored on the standard 200-yd. target. Shooting against each other in a match at Camp Ritchie, Md., both men broke the old record of 125 and went on to unprecedented heights. Temple finally stopped at 140 bulls, but Randle kept at his post until he had scored the amazing total of 196.

**Butter Market Strengthens**

The early December butter price, following steady increases up to 31 cents a pound, now equals the 1931 price, according to a National report. Despite higher prices and lighter stocks the market continues active. On November 1, butter in storage amounted to 111 million pounds compared with 160 million pounds a year earlier, a shortage of 49 million pounds. December 1st stocks amounted to 81 million pounds, compared with 138 million pounds the previous year, a shortage of 57 million pounds. The butter market is important to New York State dairymen because the price for milk used in butter and in some surplus classes is based upon the wholesale price of butter.


