**Recipe for the Week**

**NUT BREAD**  
 2 1/2 cups family flour  
 1 tbl. baking powder  
 1 cup chopped nuts (walnuts)  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 1/4 tsp. salt  
 1/2 cup evaporated milk diluted with 1/4 cup water  
 1 egg  
 Sift flour and then measure, re-sift twice. Add nuts and sugar and stir to mix well. Add diluted milk to beaten egg and combine quickly with dry ingredients. Bake in a moderate oven for one hour. Yield: One loaf 3 1/2 in. by 3 1/2 in., by 4 in.
