### CAUSES OF ABNORMAL CHICKS

Grow Too Fast or Too Slowly at Wrong Time in Egg, Dr. Hutt Says.

Abnormal chicks, those with only one eye for instance, or those whose brains protrude, twin embryos, or chicks with viscera extruding, cause about four per cent of all deaths before hatching, says Dr. F. B. Hutt, head of the poultry department at Cornell University.

He states that these abnormal chicks result simply from two causes: the parts affected have either grown too fast or have not grown at all during a critical period early in incubation. Most of these abnormalities, he says, are fatal to the chicks.

Fifty per cent of all embryos that die after the 18th day are found in abnormal positions in the egg. Dr. Hutt points out. Five types of these are known, each with minor variations. It is estimated that they

cause 25 per cent of all deaths and are, therefore, powerful factors affecting hatchability.

The normal chick lies with his head in the large end of the egg, the beak under the right wing, pointing toward the air cell. Abnormal positions include chicks that are upside down, chicks whose heads are buried between the legs, chicks with heads on the left instead of the right side, those rotated away from the air cell, and those with beaks above the wing instead of under it, Dr. Hutt says.

## Food Market Advice

**Cold Weather Makes for Higher Prices**

Unusually cold weather locally and also in the South has sharply reduced supplies of fresh vegetables and fruits and sent prices much higher. Damage done in Florida to the citrus fruits has not yet been estimated and it may prove heavy. Garden truck, with the exception of green peas, was seriously frozen. The strawberry season has been retarded. Fish catches are much smaller in cold and stormy weather and fish is therefore higher in price.

**Navel Oranges More Plentiful**

Navel oranges are more plentiful, which is good news for holiday shoppers. Even the Florida fruit may be seriously damaged, no shortage will be felt at once as there are heavy supplies on hand. Neither cooking nor box eating apples have been affected by the cold spell. They are plentiful and moderately priced.

**Root Vegetables Good Choice**

Turnips, parsnips, sweet and white potatoes, carrots and yellow and white boiling onions are all economical vegetables. Cabbage and kale are cold-resistant and also plentiful and cheap. Green beans and spinach are scarce and high.

**Salad greens are plentiful and moderately priced.** Cuban tomatoes are small because of dry weather, are of good quality and moderate in cost.

**Eggs Still Lower**

The price of fresh eggs has come even lower and they are plentiful. Breakfast eggs are again in order—soft-cooked, shirred, fried or scrambled. Custards and sponge cake may now be served to families on moderate budgets.

No change in the price of butter is anticipated even though the cold weather curtails its production.

**Loins of Pork Cheap**

Loins of pork are cheap. They should appeal to shoppers trying to save on their week's budget in favor of next week's bird, be it turkey, goose, duck or chicken. These are all expected to be at moderate prices. Legs of lamb and ribs of beef will be fairly attractive buys for the week-end.

Holiday poultry should be ordered ahead of time.
