Walnut Chews

Crunchy, nutty, tempting cookies: 1 1/2 cups sifted cake flour 2 tablespoons confectioners' sugar 1/2 cup soft butter or other shortening

3/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar 3 tablespoons cake flour 1/2 cup salt 1/2 tablespoons finely cut walnut meats

1/2 teaspoon vanilla 2 egg yolks, slightly beaten 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten

Sift 1 1/2 cups flour with confectioners' sugar. Work in butter thoroughly. Press into pan, bake in moderate oven 20 minutes. Combine brown sugar, 3 tablespoons flour, salt, nuts, vanilla and egg yolks. Add egg whites and mix gently. Spread on mixture in pan. Return to moderate oven. Bake 30 minutes. Cut in 20 strips before removing from pan.
