FORTY YEARS AGO

JANUARY 15, 1895

HOLD TWO SCHOOLS NEXT WEEK

Farm Bureau is Sponsoring Poultry School Jan. 21-22 and Dairy School January 23-24.

Professor F. A. Harper of the Farm Management Department at Cornell, will open the annual Allegany county poultry school, on January 21st, with a discussion of "The Poultry Outlook for 1936." In the afternoon he will talk on "Ways of Managing a Poultry Farm Business to Make it Pay Better." The other instructor on the opening day is Professor L. M. Hurd, from the poultry department at the college of Agriculture. He will discuss the "Feeding and Management of the Young Poultry Flock," and the "Feeding and Management of Pullets to Prevent a Molt."

On the second day, January 22nd, Dr. E. L. Brunett, of the Cornell Veterinary College will discuss poultry diseases, their prevention, and control. Professor Hurd will talk on "Ways of Ventilating a Poultry House," and "How to Tell Quality in Eggs and How it Affects Price," following this with a candling demonstration of local eggs.

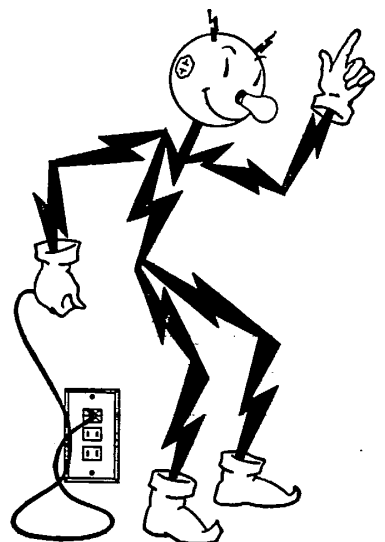
This school is being sponsored by the poultry committee of the Allegany county Farm Bureau, and they are inviting everyone who is interested in poultry, to the school. It lasts from 10 until 8 each day, and is being held in the Grange Hall at Friendship.

Practical System of Dairy Cattle Breeding Will Be Explained

Allegany county dairymen are advised to give their breeding program a "new deal" and to start looking for production records in pedigrees as they relate to transmitting ability, if they expect to increase the production of their herds. A discussion of bull indexes and herd test records as they relate to modern methods of breeding will be fully explained at the two-day Farm Bureau breeders' school scheduled for January 23-24. Professor Stanley Brownell, dairy specialist from Cornell, who is in charge of the school, will discuss the inheritance of milk and butterfat and the many ways in which the dairy cattle in Allegany county may be improved.

Two morning and two afternoon sessions are scheduled at the village hall in Belmont. None of the discussions in any of the four sessions will be repeated, and it is necessary to attend the first meetings in order to understand fully those that follow, says County Agent Earl C. Foster, who urges all dairymen to attend all meetings.
