ANDOVER DOWNS FRIENDSHIP—HEADS LEAGUE

The purple and white downed the fast yellow and green of Friendship Friday night, January 10th on the Friendship court in a two extra period game, won only by the small margin 32-31.

Fulkerson started the scoring followed by Ray Briggs and McGill. Friendship tightened her defense and aided by fouls, made by A. H. S., brought her score at the end of the first quarter 5 to 8, still Andover's lead.

However, the second quarter hardly started when Cook of Friendship sank a long shot, putting Friendship ahead 7-6. McCarthy fouled and Briggs shot, making the basket, which tied the score. Neary made the next basket and at the same time Alderson fouled and Neary's basket counted. Neary had a free shot and scored, putting Friendship once more ahead 10-7.

Ray Briggs, who played an outstanding game, made a nice long shot followed by one for Friendship which made them still ahead, 12-9. McGill fouled and McCarthy scored another point for Friendship. Cook of Friendship made a personal and again Briggs shot, ending the half in Friendship's favor, 13-11.

At the beginning of the half, Friendship and Andover both scored. Then Cannon, aided by Kemp, tied the score once more. McGill then shot, making the purple and white ahead 17-15. Andover and Friendship both fouled and the third quarter closed 18-16, Andover leading.

Supposedly the last quarter, Fulkerson received a face cut under the eye and was taken out of the game long enough to be attended to. During this quarter the score was tied at 20, 25 and 27. One minute before the end of the quarter, the score was 27-25 in Andover's favor, when Whitwood, Friendship's captain and center, scored a basket tying the score at 27.

At the beginning of the three minute extra period McGill fouled and Cook scored a basket. Then Cannon who played an excellent game came thru with two successive baskets which once more put Andover in the lead, 31-28. Andover again fouled and Cook tied the score 31-31, making necessary the second three minute period. Fulkerson shot a foul and missed, so the extra period was necessary.

During the second extra period many long shots were taken by both teams in hopes that one would find the basket and end the game. Neither team scored until Tuttle of Friendship made a personal. ACROSS THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

With the prevalence of scarlet fever in our neighboring community, undoubtedly many parents and townspeople are asking what measures are being taken to prevent an outbreak of the epidemic among our school children.

Unfortunately, there is no satisfactory inoculation against this disease as yet, which means that the only means of prevention is to avoid exposure to the disease and this is difficult to control outside the school. The most important thing that we can do is to watch carefully for any cases that may appear and report them at once to the health officer.

We are urging all pupils to report all cases of sore throat and the local physicians are co-operating in giving all possible suspects free examinations. We are investigating all absences due to sickness as far as possible. At the date of this writing there have been none of these sickness cases diagnosed as scarlet fever.

Parents are urged to keep children at home if they feel at all indisposed. Scarlet fever usually starts with sore throat, headache, and often vomiting. The glands in the neck may be slightly swollen. Parents are also urged to have a doctor examine the child and if diagnosed as a possible case of scarlet fever, all other children in the family should be kept at home and away from the patient.
