The two-day poultry school held at Friendship, Jan. 21st was reported as of especial interest, with a good attendance. About 75 present each day. Professors F. A. Harper, L. M. Hurd and Dr. Burnette of Cornell University were the principal speakers.

J. Hobart Rockwell, Allegany county WPA administrator announces approval of a new project in the town of Willing. Federal funds in the amount of \$8,676 will be made available on the project, the total cost of which is estimated at \$13,907.70. Sixteen men will be employed on the job for about nine months. The project calls for re-grading, graveling and ditching 3.4 miles of highway on the south branch of Ford's Brook, damaged in the flood of July 8th.

Election of 1936 officers in the Allegany County Herd Improvement Association resulted in president, Dr. Dana R. Scutt, Cuba; secretary-treasurer, Glenn Covell, Wellsville; directors for one year terms, Sherman herd of West Almond, Dr. I. G. Howe of Angelica, N. B. Saunders of Almond and Roy Snider and Charles Smith of Fillmore. Already 51 herds are being carefully tested by two experts in that line. In order to make it financially possible to form another group and employ a third tester, at least ten or a dozen added herds must be secured. Lester Rees of Fillmore heads a committee of six for arrangements for the annual banquet to be held in April.
