Canning Firms Jump Payments to \$4,622,000

The farm value of New York State vegetable canning crops reached a total of \$4,622,000 last year as compared to \$3,880,000 in 1934, it is reported by the State Department of Agriculture and Markets. "Farm Value" is the term used by the department for gross receipts by farmers from canning factories.

Farm value of the vegetable canning crops was computed as follows:


