American Business Journal Praises Irving D. Tillman

Norwich, Jan. 29.—In a recent issue of the Journal of American Business, Irving D. Tillman, Norwich, Chenango county clerk, is cited as "an example of effectiveness of functioning on the part of a leading incumbent."

Hornell Contractor Gets Allegany Bridges

William L. Collins of Hornell was the low bidder, at \$29,029 on the construction of four bridges in Allegany county under PWA. The contracts call for the following construction:

Town of Ward, McHenry Valley road, 70 foot timber trestle.

Town of Alfred, Pleasant Valley road, 62 foot timber trestle.

Town of Birdsall, Hiltonville road, 30 foot I-beam bridge.

Town of Ward, Vandermark road, 87 1/2 foot timber trestle.

About 90 men whose names will be taken from Ralph Hamilton's NRS lists are expected to be given employment on the contract. The state highway department's estimate for the work was \$37,266.

Hornell Factory Reopens

Wednesday morning the whistle at the former James Elgar plant blew for the first time since Nov. 27, 1932.

The plant, which was bankrupt, was salvaged from being dismantled by a company of Hornell business men, headed by Frank Humphrey, who purchased the plant last October.

The new company, known as the Hornell Woodworking Corporation, has received a loan of \$100,000 from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

The new concern has signed orders for \$147,900 worth of business, most of it for the woodwork on new school buildings and postoffice buildings.
