Last July's floods caused an economic loss of \$28,039,577 and took 40 lives in New York State, according to the last of a series of reports completed by the flood control survey. Steuben county suffered the severest damage, which is placed at \$8,320,820.

It is estimated that the amount of cinders, sand and calcium chloride used in State Highway District No. 6, which comprises Steuben, Allegany, Chemung, Yates, Schuyler and Tioga counties, will exceed all previous records of such materials used in one winter by at least five times.
