County Treasurer Claude L. Cummings has been busy this week distributing \$345,418.71, the first of two annual installments of State aid to schools in Allegany county from the state treasury at Albany.

District No. 5, W. G. Pope, superintendent, receives \$47,742.58, to be distributed to common schools as follows:

Alfred, \$4,144.30; Andover, \$2,861.20; Independence, \$2,591.90; Ward, \$4,014.86; Wellsville, \$3,323.82—total, \$20,940.03.

Amounts for high schools: Alfred, \$7,627.42; Andover, \$12,055.53; Independence, \$7,119.60—total, \$26,802.55.
