### To Map School Districts

That the State Regents department is finally getting down to business is revealed in a communication received this week by District Superintendent W. G. Pope. Mr. Pope was asked, as is all the district superintendents in the state, to prepare a map of his district, locating all school district boundaries and school buildings.

When these maps are returned to the State department, that department will have something tangible to work on in its query into the character and cost of public education in New York State, a thing which they should have had from the beginning.

While these maps will be of great assistance to the department in its planning for re-districting our schools, and the carrying out of its central school plan, the one thing that seems to us to be of major importance thru our section of the state is that these maps should be of relief type as well as showing the distance in miles. Under present transportation facilities, a few miles farther to school on a good comparatively level road seems much better to us than saving a short distance by climbing over some of the Allegheny county hills, especially during one of these Allegheny winters like the one we have just witnessed.
