SAGAS OF THE SKIES

WHEN the U. S. Army transport *Republic*, commanded by E. S. McEllan, left Panama bound for New York, all was well aboard her. But 470 miles off Miami, Florida, on June 24, 1935, four days from New York, she telegraphed a terse message to the Miami Coast Guard air station. Major Walter Gullion, U. S. A., had become critically ill and was desperately in need of immediate hospitalization. The Miami station wired back. "A plane will contact Republic June 25, 5 a.m., off Hole-in-the-Wall, Florida." Even this would not be soon enough to save Major Gullion's life, replied the surgeon on board the *Republic*. Unless earlier contact were made, the patient would not survive. Darkness was approaching, and the seas were rough. Severe rain and thunder storms made weather bad for flying. Yet, there was no doubt or hesitancy at the station. Hurried preparations were made, and a few minutes after the second message was received, the *Arcturus*, with Lieutenant Olsen at the controls, took off through the thick weather with a full load of gasoline. In spite of the heavy thunder and lightning storms, radio contact was maintained between the *Republic* and the *Arcturus* during the entire trip. After three and a half hours of flight, the *Republic's* searchlights were sighted by the *Arcturus's* observer, and the plane, after circling widely for several minutes, came out of the darkness and negotiated a successful landing on the rough sea. In the brief space of time, the *Republic* was moments away from the *Arcturus* when the transport low-

Seed Corn
