Dairymen's League Distributes \$530,000

New York, April 7.—The Dairy- men's League Co-operative Associa- tion, Inc., is distributing \$530,359 in interest to holders of the Associa- tion's certificates of indebtedness.

Interest on the association's cer- tificates of the EE, '41, '43, '44 and '45 issues become due May 1, but under the authorization of the Board of Directors Treasurer J. A. Coulter began making payments late in March. Payments are being made as fast as holders of certifi- cates present their interest coupons.

The league is urging presentation of \$194,000 worth of DD certificates which were called for payment May 1, 1935, and upon which interest ceased on that date. Holders of these certificates have nothing to gain by not cashing them. They are merely depriving themselves of the use of this money which the associa- tion is anxious to pay.
