Dam May Destroy Towns

Two once thriving Genesee river valley hamlets will be submerged under the 15-mile long lake formed by a proposed \$13,000,000 dam under consideration by directors of the Rochester Gas and Electric Corpora- tion.
They are St. Helena, for many years a prosperous center of lum- ber exporting and Gibsonville, where a large paper manufacturing plant once flourished. Both communities are now nearly deserted.
An old but unrepealed Los An- geles city ordinance forbids the grazing of more than two cows in a certain downtown area of the city where land is worth up to a thou- sand dollars a foot.
