### A DISH FOR THE WEEK

#### RHUBARB SHORTCAKE

Old fashioned biscuit crust, and rich, pink rhubarb sauce make a delicious shortcake, according to the New York State College of Home Economics.

#### Rhubarb Shortcake

2 cups of flour  
4 teaspoons of baking powder  
¼ teaspoon of salt  
¼ cup of milk  
¼ to ½ cup of butter or other shortening.

Mix the dry ingredients, sift the mixture twice, work in the shortening with fork or fingertips and add milk gradually. Toss the mixture on a floured board and divide it into two portions. Pat, roll out and place one portion in round tin, or cut it into small individual rounds with a biscuit cutter, spread them lightly with melted butter and place the other half on top. Bake from 12 to 15 minutes in a hot oven, 450 degrees Fahrenheit.

Cut tender pink rhubarb shoots into small pieces. Boil one-half cup of water and one cup of sugar for every four cups of rhubarb. Add the rhubarb and cook until it is tender. Cool.

Put rhubarb sauce between layers and on top of the piping hot shortcake, and serve with additional rhubarb sirup, with whipped cream, or plain frozen cream.

Suggested menu: Baked hamburger rolls, scalloped potatoes, buttered asparagus, tomato jelly salad, whole wheat bread and butter and rhubarb shortcake.
