SOIL BUILDING RATES APPROVED

Payments Possible for Many Farm Practices in New York State, According to L. R. Simons.

Soil-building practices which will qualify New York farmers for payments under the 1936 agricultural conservation program and rates of payment for those practices have been announced by L. R. Simons, state director of extension.

The practices for which payments will be made this year include improving established pastures, establishing new seedings of grasses and legumes, planting green manure crops, planting forest trees, mulching orchards and controlling wind erosion.

Payments will be made as soon as possible after county committees have observed the soil building practices actually used this year by farmers who file applications for payments. The schedule of practices and rates for New York was drawn up by the State Agricultural Conservation Committee and recommended to the Secretary of Agriculture. Director Simons made his announcement upon receiving word that the recommendations had been approved.

Payments for soil-building practices are known as Class II payments under the 1936 conservation program.

Class I payments are made for diverting acreage from soil-depleting crops to soil-conserving crops. Class II payments will be made for soil building practices on either diverted acreage or on other crop land or pasture.

Director Simons pointed out that regardless of acre rates, there is a top limit to the total soil building payment that may be made on any one farm. That top limit, or soil-building allowance, is equal to one dollar for every acre the farm has in soil conserving crops such as hay and rotated pastures this year.

In general, he said, the rates of payment represent part of the cash outlay farmers make to improve the land. "The idea of the national program," he said, "is to encourage good use of land by sharing the expense of the farming methods best suited to each region. The soil building practices recommended by the State Committee were drawn up in the same spirit."

"To receive payment, a farmer is required to carry out the practices in accordance with sound farming methods. Not all of the practices are suitable for adoption on all farms in the state. Requirements are different for different soils and at different times of the year, and alternatives have been set up so that each farmer can choose the one best suited to his particular farm."
