Hammondsport Men Buy Railroad

The Bath and Hammondsport branch of the Erie railroad system has been purchased by a group of Hammondsport men who will repair and operate the road.

The tracks were so badly damaged by last year's flood that the Erie asked permission to abandon the road, thus leaving Hammondsport without railroad facilities.

The new owners will start repairs at once and will operate the road as a common carrier.

State Fair Money Released

Fifty-eight town and county fair associations received their apportionment of the \$250,000 state aid fund this week.

Allegany County Agricultural Society is listed to receive \$4,485.46 this year to help pay the fair premiums for the promotion of the breeding of farm animals.

Churches Eligible for Credit Plan

Churches may now take advantage of the Federal Housing Administration Modernization Credit Plan, to make repairs or improvements in church property, it is announced by W. Grant King, Western New York District Director.

This action, viewed favorably by leading Western New York clergymen, will enable churches to obtain funds from local financial institutions on a long-term basis, the loan being eligible for insurance by the Federal Housing Administration.

Such funds must be used for property improvement, and may cover such items as repairs, alterations, building of additions, or installation of heating, lighting and plumbing systems. It may also cover landscaping, laying of walks or driveways, or installation of kitchen equipment.
