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Make Prompt Payments

Cattaraugus and Allegany county members of the Iroquois National farm loan association were recently commended by the Federal Land Bank for their "good payment" record on farm mortgage loans. Formed in 1933 as a co-operative farm mortgage agency under Federal charter, the association has 165 members whose loans amount to \$293,000.

On May 15, over 98 per cent of its members had paid all matured installments on their loans. The Springfield Land Bank, to which the farmers make their payments, acts as the financing agency for the association. Mortgages which the farmers give to the local unit when the loans are granted are turned over to the Land Bank to use as security for bonds which are bought by private investors.

New loans are now being made from such funds by the Iroquois association to Cattaraugus and Allegany county farmers on contracts for 20 to 33 years, at a permanent interest rate of four per cent.
