Food Market Advice

WE ARE entering the big vegetable season in spite of the present shortage and high price of potatoes. The dinner plate need not include potatoes for other root vegetables can take their place, more bread may be served or rice, macaroni, spaghetti, or noodles be the filling food.

Beets, carrots, kohlrabi, onions and turnips are all cheap and nourishing. Peas are moderate in price and have more nourishment than most above ground vegetables except corn. It's still a bit early for best quality corn and it is not yet cheap but it's here for those who wish it. Cabbage has joined the high group but cauliflower is much lower. Green beans are lower but broccoli is high in price. Eggplant, spinach and squash are reasonable while nearby greens are cheap.

Tomatoes, Cucumbers, Salad Greens Cheap

It looks as if salad time were here what with the low price of tomatoes, cucumbers and nearby Boston lettuce, romaine, escarole and chicory. Nearby iceberg lettuce, too, is cheap, but Western iceberg is rather expensive.

JULY 15 DEADLINE IN SOIL PROGRAM

Special Permission Needed to File Work Sheets After That Date.

Farmers in Allegany county and throughout New York State have until July 15, 1936 to file their work sheets under the Agricultural Conservation program, according to an announcement by Roy A. Porter of Elba, chairman of the state committee.

Mr. Porter says July 15 is the deadline after which no more work sheets will be received by county committees except by special permission of the state committee. In exceptional cases, permits for late filing may be granted to farmers who apply in writing to the state committee and give justifiable reasons why they were unable to file before July 15.

"Do not wait until the last day to

file work sheets. There is bound to be a rush in various county offices, and it is possible that office facilities and personnel may not be able to cope with all late comers.

Only a short time remains to file work sheets. Already, 22,000 New York farmers have done so and are in a position to receive the payments under the program. No payment will be granted to any farmer who has not filed a work sheet with his county committee.

Mr. Porter emphasizes that the closing date of July 15 will be strictly observed, and no time extension will be granted except by special permission to individuals upon written application to the state committee.
