Over a period of ten years, the State of New York claims that the City of Hornell charged intoxicated drivers with "public intoxication" to evade paying the State the money in fines collected. The State is suing the city in Supreme Court for \$6,881.00. The trial is now in progress.

J. Hobart Rockwell, Allegany county WPA manager, has received word that funds have been allocated for the improvement of the water system in the village of Friendship. The federal contribution amounts to \$4,840.60 and the village will expend \$2,896.25 on the work. Thirteen WPA workers will be employed for a period of three months.

Captain Lloyd L. Brown, who has been in command of CCC Camp S-92 at West Almond since June 25, 1934, has been promoted to command of the Sixth New York Sub-District. This is an area including 16 CCC camps and the counties of Allegany, Niagara, Orleans, Erie, Wyoming, Livingston, Chautauqua, and Cattaraugus and parts of Monroe and Steuben.

The New York State Highway Department, WPA workers, Youth Administration workers, men under James Culbert, superintendent of Cuba Lake Reservation, aided by equipment owned by the town of Cuba, are transforming the former "Maloney Grove" into a public park of nearly three acres, which is estimated will accommodate 1,000 to 2,000 picknickers.
