Around Our House

KEEPING COOL

Keeping cool, one of summer's big- jobs, is made easier by certain daily- habits, says the New York State Col- lege of Home Economics.

This house can be made more com- fortable by drawing the shades to- shut out the direct sunlight; and if- the air out-of-doors is very hot and- still, close the windows and doors- during the day and open them com- pletely only at night. Use screen- porches and out-of-door living rooms- in shady places for housekeeping- tasks as well as for leisure.

In addition to comfortable hous- ing, wear the minimum of cool, sim- ply made and loose-fitting clothing, made of porous fabrics that will- stand frequent tubbings, and cool, easy-fitting shoes. Eat less food- that produces fuel and heat, such as- starches, meats, and sweets, and eat- more green vegetables and fresh- fruits.

Drink a good deal of water and- fruit juices without sugar which- will stimulate perspiration, the- body's way to reduce temperature. Use plenty of water both outside- as well as inside the body, and re-

member that the daily bath keeps- the pores of the skin open so that- they can perform the heat reducing- function. Plan any necessary physi- cal labor at the beginning or end of- the day rather than in the middle, the- time of greatest heat.
