Bolivar, July 23.—The Andover Thomas M. Lynch Post No. 397, and the Andover Fire Department have been invited to march in parades during Bolivar's second annual old home week, July 27 to August 1. Eleven prizes aggregating \$110 will be given winning entries during the two parades.

The Legion and Civic Parade will fall on Wednesday, July 29th, officially called Legion Day, when upwards of five hundred Legionnaires and auxiliary members will be in Bolivar for the annual Allegany County Legion convention.
