An automobile is potentially a dangerous instrumentality, as the appalling number of fatalities brought about every day by its operation bear distressing witness. To drive such an instrumentality through the public streets of a city so recklessly "as to endanger property and individuals" is an act of such obvious depravity that to characterize it as a petty danger property and individuals" is an act or such obvious depravity that to characterize it as a petty offense would be to shock the general moral sense. If the act of the respondent described in the information plane had culminated in the death of a human being, respondent would have been subject to an indictment for some degree of felonious homicide.

The question seems to be whether the defendant
