### CLEAN FLOWER BEDS

Most of the common disease-producing germs live thru the winter on old, infected parts of plants. Some gardeners place these diseased parts in compost heaps, and thus re-introduce the germs or fungi into the garden the following year. Others allow the diseased or old plants to remain in the garden thruout the winter.

Both of these practices tend to increase the prevalence of diseases. The wise thing is to burn all plant debris each fall, regardless of whether it is known to be infected.

Strict sanitation is one practice all gardeners should follow. It costs little and aids greatly in keeping plant diseases in check.
