### Around Our House

Care of Canned Foods Half the battle of putting food for the winter months seems to end with the canning, preserving' and pickling. A few important things however, should be remembered about these foods, says the New York State College of Home! Economics.

Consider first where and how! Many directions they are stored. say "Store in a cool place." To this the college adds: store in a clean, well-ventilated place. Shelves t near furnaces and steam pipes may be too warm in the winter for safe! storage. Food on shelves near outer walls should be carefully watched so there is no danger of freezing. a place, the color of the contents mold may grow on the jars; this will not injure the food provided method is to store the jars in well-ventilated dry place where no

mold will grow. Tin cans and flat-topped jars can 🎩 be stacked on shelves and thus save more space than glass jars which cannot be stacked one over another. If the distance between the shelves is planned carefully, however, even glass jars that do not have flat tops may be stored with little loss c


