## Wellsville Youth in Car Crash

Howard Washburn, 24, of Wellsville is in a critical condition at Jones Memorial Hospital following an auto crash on the Wellsville-Scio highway, early Tuesday morning.

Washburn's car struck a concrete culvert, sometime early in the morning. A party of Houghton people enroute for New York, reported the accident with what they presumed to be a dead man in the wreckage, to Jones Memorial hospital early in the morning. Undertaker Embury going to the scene with his ambulance.

With the help of a neighboring farmer the injured man was removed from the wreckage and taken to the hospital, where he was still unconscious Wednesday.

Examination at the hospital showed a fractured skull, scalp badly lacerated, right femur fractured and his right ankle fractured besides suffering severely from exposure. It is estimated that he was exposed to the cold two or three hours.
