4-H Potato Queen, 19, Did All Work Herself

Troy.—Nineteen-year-old Kathryn Cytrynak set what Rensselaer county 4-H Club officials announced was the record potato yield per acre in New York State this season—and did all the work herself.
Kathryn raised a crop of 641 bushels on a little over three-quarters of an acre for an average yield of 766 bushels per acre.
Working with Samuel B. Torrance of the County 4-H Clubs and Dr. A. J. Pratt of the New York State College of Agriculture, the girl did all the planting, cultivating and harvesting. The field, a sandy loam soil, was plowed by her father.
"Many mornings," her mother disclosed, "Kathryn was up before 4 o'clock to work in her field."

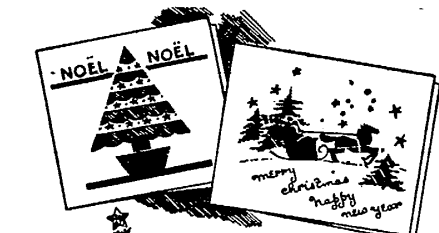
