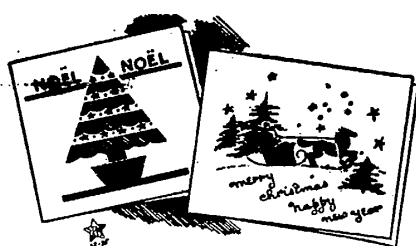
Like Mother Used to Make
