JASPER TUESDAY NIGHT

The Andover High School basketball team outclassed Jasper, Steuben county C champions Tuesday evening at the Andover gymnasium by a 30 to 15 margin. Using their superior speed to offset the greater height of their rangy opponents, the Andover team took the lead at the start and were never headed. The score at half time was 11 to 7.

The Jasper team made its only serious bid for the game in the third quarter, when they tied the game 14 all. The Andover second team rushed into the game to hold the rally and to start the drive which swamped the Steuben county team. The first team went back into the game at the midway mark of the last quarter, decisively outplaying the tiring visitors.

The program will consist of musical numbers by the girls' chorus, boys' trio, and orchestra, and several drills and pantomimes by the girls' chorus assisted by members of the lower grades. These are all being directed by Mrs. Leona Scott, music supervisor.

A special feature of the program is a presentation of the one act Christmas play, "Why the Chimes Rang." This is a dramatization of the well known story by that name and is a very beautiful production. The play is being staged as a co-operative enterprise by the Junior and Senior high school faculty, under the general supervision of Prin. and Mrs. Glenn E. Bretsch. Miss Mary L. Day is cast director; Mr. Host and Mr. McGee will be in charge of stage management and lighting; Miss Baker and Mrs. Joyce are responsible for costumes and Mrs. VanOxx, Miss O'Connell and Miss Killigrew will be in charge of properties. Miss DeWitt will be stage art director. The cast for the play has been selected from the Junior and Senior high school pupils. Tickets will be sold for this entertainment and the proceeds will be used to help provide the girls' chorus with uniforms.

For several years it has been the custom in each grade here at Christmas time for each pupil to present a gift to the teacher and the teacher to give a present to each pupil in her room; this in addition to an exchange of gifts among the pupils and the usual supply of candy and other eats for the Christmas party.

Such a procedure seems to me wasteful, and not in keeping with the true spirit of this most beautiful season of Christmas. Under these circumstances, giving becomes a responsibility rather than a free expression of the heart, and it likewise becomes a burden, both to the teacher and to many of her pupils. The gifts thus presented are often of little value to either pupils or teachers and yet, taken all together, represent a considerable sum of money that could be used to much better advantage in other ways.

And so I have taken the step of requesting that teachers this year neither give nor receive individual gifts in the classrooms. The pupils may continue to draw names for inexpensive gifts among themselves and the teacher's name may be included among these, but pupils are requested not to present other gifts individually to their teacher. The usual Christmas parties with the programs, good times and eats will of course be held, and if any pupil feels that he should make some personal contribution, there is no remembrance that a teacher will cherish any more from her pupils than a simple Christmas card, either purchased or hand made.

way.

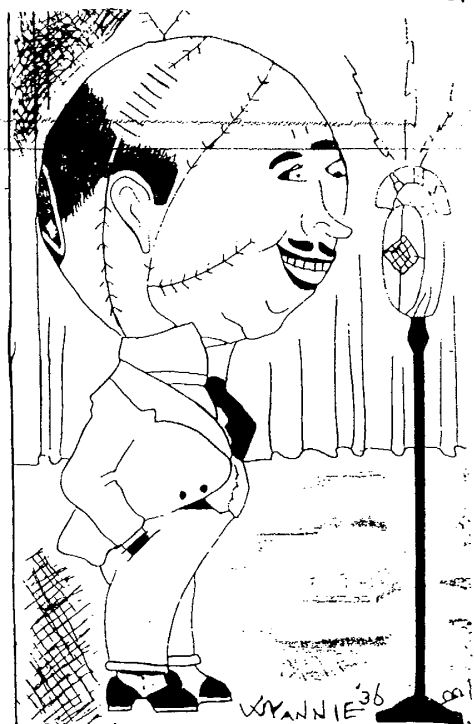
Three mountaineers, Bill, Jake and
