Drillers Plan Seventh Well

Belmont—Refusing to be discour- aged by the finding of but little gas in the Oriskany sand in four of six failures in Central Allegany county, the Wittmer Gas Company of Pitts- burgh is making plans to start a seventh venture in a few days.

The last test well has been lo- cated on the Terwilliger farm two miles north of Angelica and not far from the south line of the Town of Allen. It is one and one-half miles southwest of the Snyder "dry" hole drilled by the Wittmers and others one year ago.

Geologists are satisfied that there is plenty of Oriskany gas in this immediate section if they can tap the proper domes where it lies. Some excellent sand has been found in other wells drilled in the towns of Angelica and Allen, but lacking in sufficient porosity to be easily pen- etrated by supplies lying near the well.
