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Waldron Named Manager Buffalo Niagar Elec. Corp.

Harold R. Waldron, supervisor of Niagara Lockport & Ontario Power Company districts, has been named manager of the Buffalo district of the Buffalo Niagara Electric Corporation, it was announced this week by Col. William Kelly, president of the Buffalo Niagara & Eastern Power Corporation.

Wilfred C. Stephens, Niagara Falls district manager, succeeds Mr. Waldron as district supervisor of the Niagara Lockport & Ontario Power Company districts.

Mr. Waldron has been active in the electrical industry in New York State for almost 30 years. He is a graduate of Syracuse University with a degree of electrical engineer and started with the Syracuse Lighting Company in 1908 as a lineman.

At the outbreak of the World War he enlisted in the army and served as a captain in the signal corps. He went to Jamestown in 1925 as assistant district manager and was appointed manager in 1928. He was appointed supervisor of districts in 1930 for the Niagara Lockport & Ontario Power company.
