## WHERE STATES MAY EXHIBIT AT NEW YORK FAIR



NEW YORK, (Special)—When in 1939 the residents of the several states and territories visit the New York World's Fair, they will find their local representatives and the "home" exhibits in the "Hall of States", shown here at the right in a first drawing of the "Plaza of Governments", ceremonial centre of the \$125,000,000 international exposition.

The quadrangle will be large enough to permit such exercises as the massing of the flags of the states or of the colors of the world—while tens of thousands of spectators watch from the vantage of the broad flights of steps which form one architectural feature of the many already planned by the Fair Corporation.

In the background is the proposed "Federal Hall" and, at the left, a range of other Government buildings. The principal approach to the great Plaza will be from the direction of the "Thematic Centre" of the Fair, over an extraordinarily broad avenue lined with row upon row of grown shade trees flanking low water basins and cascades.
