Mrs. Sara R. Cannon passed away at 1:30 p. m., Saturday 5, 1938, at the Wyandover Community hospital in York, following an illness of several months duration. Mrs. Cannon was born in Andover, N. Y., June 17, 1878, a daughter of Edward and Mary Byrne. She came to Andover at the age of 10 years as an instructor over High School, a position she filled with marked efficiency until her marriage in 1898 to James P. Cannon of Andover. Mrs. Cannon has always had a deep interest in serving for several years on the Board of Education. She has also been active in the Y. W. C. A., an anthropic and benevolent woman of culture and kind neighbor, devoted to a true friend. A dark face passed over our
