4-H Dairy Club last week, members voted to expand their annual activities and project requirements. Dairy club work in Allegany county has been limited during the past seven | years to only those boys and girls who were fortunate enough to own purebreds. Thus because of limited funds and the scarcity of good purebred calves, hundreds of boys and girls have been denied the activities of 4-H Dairy Club work. In order to correct this situation,

committee of the Allegany County

projects in the rearing of high quality grade calves are now included in the 4-H program. A boy or girl enrolling in the grade heifer calf project is required

to own a well bred grade heifer calf. He will rear the calf following the general recommendations given the 4-H Dairy handbook and keep an accurate feed record. Classes will be provided at the county fair 'for grades if they meet certain production requirements. The activities that will be offered

o boys and girls in the new 4-H Dairy program are as follows: Training in the selection of high quality foundation heifers (grade and purebred), participation in judging contests and demonstrations, practical experience in the rearing of heifers and in the feeding of production cows, show ring experience and dairy cattle competitions, the selection of herd sires and a study of pedigrees, study of disease prevention and control, the keeping of feed and pro-

It is the hope of the 4-H Dairy Club committee that many more legany county boys and girls will now participate in their program as result of the change in project reon this new project will be forwarded upon request to the 4-H of ce at Belmont.


