A Holstein cow owned by Arling Cobb of Whitesville, tops records made during January by cows in 67 dairy herds owned by members of the Allegany County Dairy Herd Improvement Association. This cow made the remarkable production of 91.8 pounds of butterfat from 2,238 pounds of milk. Mr. Cobb has two other cows with high production last month, one producing 86.1 and another 80.8 pounds fat.

A high record for average herd production per cow was made in the eight-cow Holstein herd of Carl Clarke of Andover, the figure being 53.8 pounds butterfat per animal.
