The sunshiny days and cold nights of the current spell of winter portend a favorable season for the maple sugar and syrup industry. The mid-winter flow of sap from which these maple products are made is largely dependent upon weather conditions. The conditions are just right for a good year, says Secretary James F. Bogardus of the State Department of Forests and Waters.

The construction of the new barrel house at the Allegany Refiners, Inc., plant, which is being built by the Austin company, construction engineers of Cleveland, Ohio, is gradually taking form. The structure, 80 feet long and 60 feet wide, when finished will have complete facilities for blending, canning, storing and packing Bolivar motor oil, and will be capable of producing up to 60,000 gallons of motor oil a day. It is expected that the plan will be completed about the first of April.

One of the completed projects of the experiment station at the Ceramic Experiment Station at Alfred University, under the research work of Prof. H. G. Schubecht and Morris Corbman, demonstrates the possibility of producing mortars of equal or better qualities than many now commonly used. Finely ground New York State clays and shales take the place of lime, thus raising the adhesive compressive and tensile strength of the mortar. Such a mortar shows greater resistance to freezing, more water retention, seeming less shrinkage and at less cost.
