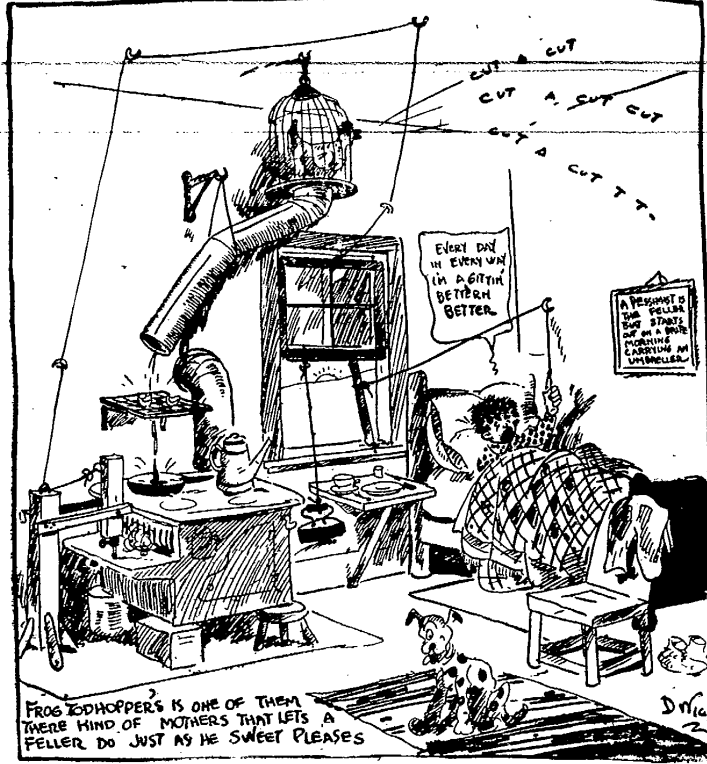

## A DISH FOR THE WEEK

Cabbage, rich in vitamins A and C, makes a delicious winter salad green. This recipe, suggested by the New York State College of Home Economics, uses whipped cream and horse-radish dressing.

**Cabbage Salad With Whipped Cream Dressing**

- 1 cup of whipping cream.
- 4 tablespoons of lemon juice.
- 1 1/2 teaspoons of salt.
- 1 teaspoon of sugar.
- 1 teaspoon of scraped onion.
- 3 tablespoons of ground horse-radish.

3 cups of shredded green cabbage.  
2 raw carrots.

Shred the cabbage fine with a long thin knife and slice thin the raw carrots. If desired, crisp them by covering with cold water, let them stand for one-half hour, then drain, wrap in a cloth and place on ice or in a cold place until ready to use. Whip the cream and add the seasonings to it. Just before serving, toss the vegetables together lightly with the seasoned whipped cream. This recipe will make six to eight servings.

For dinner the college suggests: Creamed potatoes with parsley garnish, broiled liver and bacon, squash, cabbage salad with whipped cream dressing, whole wheat bread and butter, maple nut cake, coffee or tea and milk at least for the children. Instead of mixing with the highly seasoned salad dressing, salad vegetables for small children may be finely shredded, flavored with lemon juice and spread on whole wheat bread for sandwiches.

Fresh cod-liver oil stains will usually come out if they are rubbed promptly with a little dry-cleaning solvent like carbon tetrachloride, and then the stained fabric washed in luke-warm water.

## Homemakers' Exchange

of Helpful Household Hints and Recipes

When building a grate fire, lay one or two short ends of used-up candles among the burning or in the coal, and they ignite in a short time the fire will be burning merrily.

If you have several partially emptied glasses of jelly left over, you may wonder, as do many other homemakers, just how to use up those last bits. If so, try this idea: store these left-over jellies in a modern air-conditioned ice refrigerator, where they will stay moist and fine flavored. Then, when you have a large enough supply, melt all together, pour into fresh glasses, and you will have a delightful new flavored fresh mold of jelly.

Shake your family like Hot Dogs? If so, here is an unusual way to serve them: When baking fresh yeast rolls, wrap strips of the dough around weiners, allowing the ends to stick out of their dough blanket. Give the dough time to double in bulk and bake as usual. If you have a modern air-conditioned ice refrigerator store the yeast dough in it, and remove just long enough before baking to allow time for rising. Yeast doughs keep sweet, fresh, and properly moist when stored in the cold, circulating, moist air of these modern ice refrigerators.

To prevent pictures from slipping and hanging unevenly, first hang them from the wall, then cross the wires. They will never slip.
