## Editorial

### ST. PATRICK'S DAY

Today, March 17th, again brings the wearing of the green with the celebration of St. Patrick's Day.

England, Scotland and France—anyone may have been the birthplace of St. Patrick. Authorities cannot accurately determine in which country he was born.

The word "Patrick" originated from the Roman word, "Patrius."

The life of St. Patrick was one of romance and adventure. At the age of 16 he was captured by pirates from Ireland and taken to that island where for six years he was forced to tend sheep for an Ulster chieftan. During these years of wretched slavery he became a Christian and after his escape entered monastic life. Directed by a vision he returned to Ireland in 432 as a missionary and devoted his entire life to zealous working in his adopted country. So successful was his work as a missionary that he became known as "one who found Ireland heathen and left it Christian." He established over 800 churches and baptized over 120,000 people.

Many of the tales surrounding the name of St. Patrick are purely legendary and fictitious. The shamrock originated during his time, however, as the national emblem of Ireland.

Wherever the Irish have penetrated whether it be in America, Europe or any section of the world, March 17th is celebrated as St. Patrick's feast day and it will no doubt continue to be a day of celebration for centuries to come.

## Bolivar Host to A. C. S. P. A.

The third meeting of the Allegany County Scholastic Press Association took place at Bolivar, Saturday, March 12th. It was a successful meeting from every standpoint.

The meeting began at 10 o'clock with a social hour which lasted until 11, and included dancing, a tour of the building, including the journalism room where all school papers were exhibited, ping-pong and shuffleboard in the gymnasium.

From 11 to 12 o'clock there was an entertainment in the high school auditorium, under the leadership of Fred Stimson, president, and sponsored by members of the Bolivar school. The program consisted of: Cornet selections, by Irene Richardson; piano selections by Joseph Matson; a one-act play, "Getting a Job." Characters: Mary, Phyllis Coyle; John, Robert Nagle; Mr. Ford Thomas Ackerman; Miss Watson, Jean Turner.

The program closed with saxophone selections by Susan Green, state and national saxophone solo contest winner. Miss Frances Varden was the accompanist for both Miss Richardson and Miss Green.

Luncheon was served in the cafeteria from 12 to 1 by the cafeteria staff.

After the luncheon the members adjourned to the auditorium where they were welcomed by Principal Whitford of Bolivar Central School.

Raymond Woods, a representative of the Oakley Stationery Company, gave a color demonstration on the mimeograph machine, explaining in detail the best methods to operate a mimeograph machine to receive satisfactory results.

Following the demonstration Fred Stimson, president of the A. C. S. P. A. took charge of the program, which began with the reading of a letter addressed to the association from Mr. Herrick the editor of the Bolivar Breeze. Mr. Herrick has spent some time in carefully examining the school papers on the exchange list of the Bolivar Central School "Sentinel." He criticized severely these papers and their staffs by pointing out that too much space was devoted to columns, essays and jokes, none of which are news. The editor of the Bolivar Breeze did not confine his criticism to destruction alone, but showed how the papers can be generally improved. He suggested omitting the jokes columns and essays and printing only strictly news items. A staff should be alert, watchful and quick to search out news. Mr. Herrick also gave advice on the technique of writing a news article, outlining some of the elementary rules of journalism.

The meeting continued then with discussion from the students present. Andover was asked to speak on "Editorials," in which the editor, Katherine Barber, pointed out that in order to receive the full benefit of editorials, it is necessary to know their purpose.

The Friendship editor, Helen Bull, spoke on awards for staff members. Several suggestions were made, among which were a quill for the entire staff, a quill pen for the entire staff; awards for Senior members only; awards for officers and awards for editors only. A representative from Rushford spoke on special columns emphasizing the feature article.

The next meeting of the A. C. S. P. A. will be held at night at Alfred some time in May.

In a timely and interesting talk, Mr. Willard Sutton, professor of chemistry at Fukien Christian University at Fochow, China, told the Senior and Junior high students many different things about China in assembly last Friday, Mar. 11th.

The Chinese want to read and write. Their goal in life is scholarship. The Chinese honor the educated people so much that they have a stove on the street in which papers of all kinds are burned instead of being trampled underfoot.

He illustrated some of the Chinese dialects and some of the symbols by which they write. The Chinese government has appropriated a great deal of money for the building of schools, the engagement of teachers and the purchasing of books of foreign languages.
